
# Chico Buarque: A Literary and Musical Icon of Brazilian Culture



#### Chico Buarque's First Chico Buarque (33 1/3 Brazil)

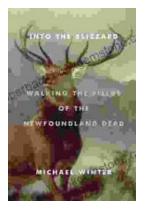
