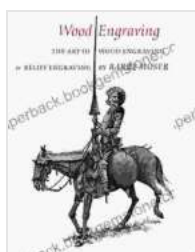

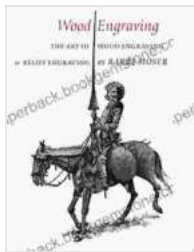
1. Create a design on paper or directly onto the block of wood or metal plate.

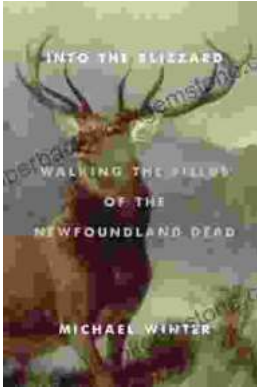
